

Lesson #3, Civil War

"David was about thirty years of age when Saul and Jonathan fell in combat against the Philistines on Mount Gilboa. He had already extensive military experience and success. He also possessed an intimate knowledge of the day-by-day operations of government. Behind him was a dashing life of adventure and intrigue. No great kingdom had been subdued by David. No great riches were amassed. He sat amidst the rubble of Ziklag. Yet deep lines of character had been carved by God's providence within the young man's spirit. As in days gone by the Lord had prepared Joseph in slavery and Daniel in exile, so now He molded the spirit of him from whose line the throne would never pass."

- 1 Then it came about afterwards that David inquired of the Lord, saying, "Shall I go up to one of the cities of Judah?" And the Lord said to him, "Go up." So David said, "Where shall I go up?" And He said, "To Hebron." 2 So David went up there, and his two wives also, Ahinoam the Jezreelitess and Abigail the widow of Nabal the Carmelite. 3 And David brought up his men who were with him, each with his household; and they lived in the cities of Hebron. 4 Then the men of Judah came and there anointed David king over the house of Judah. And they told David, saying, "It was the men of Jabeshgilead who buried Saul."
- 5 David sent messengers to the men of Jabesh-gilead, and said to them, "May you be blessed of the Lord because you have shown this kindness to Saul your lord, and have buried him. 6 "Now may the Lord show lovingkindness and truth to you; and I also will show this goodness to you, because you have done this thing.
- 7 "Now therefore, let your hands be strong and be valiant; for Saul your lord is dead, and also the house of Judah has anointed me king over them."

- [1.] v:1-4, Considering I Sam 16:4 & 30:26, why would David select one of the cities of Judah from which to rule?
- [2.] Locate Hebron on the map on page 1.
- [3.] Over whom was David anointed this second time? (Recall I Sam 16:1-13)
- [4.] v:5-7, Why would the men of Jabesh-gilead care about Saul's dead body? (I Sam 11:1-11)

[5.] v:7, What was David implying when he told the men of Jabesh-gilead that the house of Judah has anointed me king over them.?

David was not yet free to set the tone of peace among the people of God. Jabesh Gilead was on the east of the Jordan River. Another strong man had just settled there. Abner was Saul's first cousin, son of the brother of Saul's father. That made him cousin to David through the latter's marriage to Michal.₂

Abner: Saul's chief of staff, sat beside Saul at the feasts, brought David into Saul's presence after he killed Goliath, joined Saul's searches for David and his band, was publicly humiliated by David (I Sam 26:14-16).

8 But Abner the son of Ner, commander of Saul's army, had taken Ish-bosheth the son of Saul and brought him over to Mahanaim. 9 He made him king over Gilead, over the Ashurites, over Jezreel, over Ephraim, and over Benjamin, even over all Israel. 10 Ish-bosheth, Saul's son, was forty years old when he became king over Israel, and he was king for two years. The house of Judah, however, followed David. 11 The time that David was king in Hebron over the house of Judah was seven years and six months.

12. Now Abner the son of Ner, went out from Mahanaim to Gibeon with the servants of Ish-bosheth the son of Saul. 13 And Joab the son of Zeruiah and the servants of David went out and met them by the pool of Gibeon; and they sat down, one on the one side of the pool and the other on the other side of the pool. 14 Then Abner said to Joab, "Now let the young men arise and hold a contest before us. " And Joab said, "Let them arise." 15 So they arose and went over by count, twelve for Benjamin and Ishbosheth the son of Saul, and twelve of the servants of David. 16 Each one of them seized his opponent by the head and thrust his sword in his opponent's side; so they fell down together. Therefore that place was called Helkath-hazzurim, which is in Gibeon.

17 That day the battle was very severe, and Abner and the men of Israel were beaten before the servants of David.

[7.] Locate Mahanaim on the map on page 1.

[8.] v:10 & 11, We have Ish-bosheth as king over Israel and David over Judah. Looking at your map on page 1, whom do you supposed the tribe of Simeon would follow.

Whom do you guess Jabesh-gilead would follow?

[9.] From v:13, who was the commander of David's army?

[10.] v:12-16, Who brought the troops from Mahanaim to Gibeon, the border of Judah?

[11.] Who suggested the "contest" at the pool of Gibeon?

[12.] v:17, What do you suppose Abner wanted from the battle that day?

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18 Now the three sons of Zeruiah were there, Joab and Abishai and Asahel (as-aw-ale'); and Asahel was as swift-footed as one of the gazelles which is in the field.

19 Asahel pursued Abner and did not turn to the right or to the left from following Abner. 20 Then Abner looked behind him and said, "Is that you, Asahel?" And he answered, "It is I." 21 So Abner said to him, "Turn to your right or to your left, and take hold of one of the young men for yourself, and take for yourself his spoil." But Asahel was not willing to turn aside from following him. 22 Abner repeated again to Asahel, "Turn aside from following me. Why should I strike you to the ground? How then could I lift up my face to your brother Joab?" 23 However, he refused to turn aside; therefore Abner struck him in the belly with the butt end of the spear, so that the spear came out at his back. And he fell there and died on the spot. And it came about that all who came to the place where Asahel had fallen and died, stood still.

24 But Joab and Abishai pursued Abner, and when the sun was going down, they came to the hill of Ammah, which is in front of Giah by the way of the wilderness of Gibeon. 25 The sons of Benjamin gathered together behind Abner and became one band, and they stood on the top of a certain hill. 26 Then Abner called to Joab and said, "Shall the sword devour forever? Do you not know that it will be bitter in the end? How long will you refrain from telling the people to turn back from following their brothers?" 27 Joab said, "As God lives, if you had not spoken, surely then the people would have gone away in the morning, each from following his brother."

28 So Joab blew the trumpet; and all the people halted and pursued Israel no longer, nor did they continue to fight anymore. 29 Abner and his men then went through the Arabah all that night; so they crossed the Jordan, walked all morning, and came to Mahanaim.

[17.] v:26, List Abner's three statements that he called to Joab.

[18.] Did Abner make these statements when he invaded Judah or when his personnel ambitions were about to be dashed?

[19.] v:27-29, Why do you feel the Lord had Joab blow the trumpet and stop the conflict?

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30 Then Joab returned from following Abner; when he had gathered all the people together, nineteen of David's servants besides Asahel were missing. 31 But the servants of David had struck down many of Benjamin and Abner's men, so that three hundred and sixty men died. 32 And they took up Asahel and buried him in his father's tomb which was in Bethlehem. Then Joab and his men went all night until the day dawned at Hebron.

[20.] v:30-32, Why did God make it so difficult for David to ascend to the throne?

[21.] For us as Christian men in spiritual warfare, will victories come easy?
